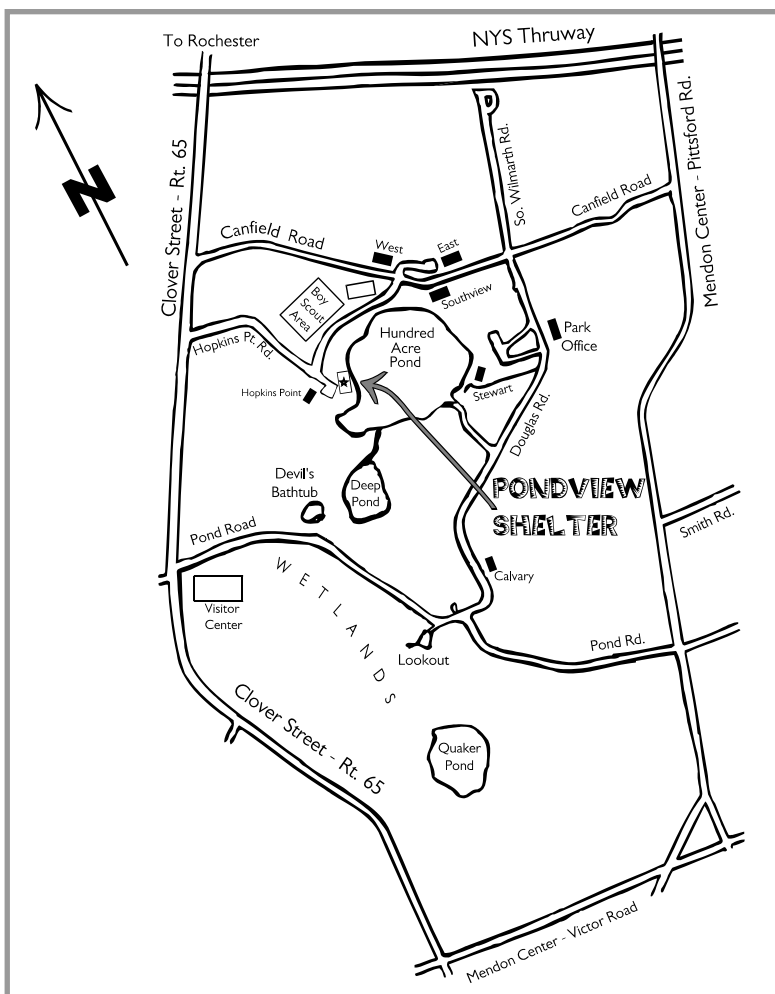

CPOS is the home society of John and Shirley Dunkelberger, who have supported the ribbon and AOS judging at our show for many years. The CPOS show is held in an agricultural arena with a mulch floor. People can drive their cars right up to their exhibit space and unload. Water is permitted in exhibits, and as this is a great source of inspiration for Jeanne, the exhibit contained running water in the form of small streams falling into a pool from copper leaves mounted on a wooden branch. GROS Exhibits In Erie For First Time

Over the weekend of May 12-14, The Orchid Society of North West Pennsylvania held its annual show in Erie, PA. OSNWPA entered an exhibit at our show here in Rochester in

March, and we were happy to return the favor. Hopefully this exhibit exchange will happen every year. Jeanne Kaeding set up the exhibit; Diane Bernard took it down. Again, running water was the theme of the GROS exhibit. Ten society members contributed plants to this exhibit: Fran Murphy, Robert Wyman, Dwaine Levy, Mark Kaczynski, Randy Humphries, Jeanne Kaeding, Sandi Uhlig, Suzanne Flanders, Mark Gillette and Susie Myers.

Sandi Uhlig's *Miltoniopsis* Princess Diana received an 84 point AM from the American Orchid Society. She had presented the plant on the GROS show table at the May meeting as part of a media experiment, so many of you have seen the flowers. She put the clone name 'Sadie' on the plant as a tribute to her new granddaughter.

Our two local vendors at the show, Jim Marlow of Marlow Orchids and Joe Kunisch of Bloomfield Orchids, also did well. Joe received an 82 pt AM for his *Catasetum complanatum*, a beautiful arching spray of green flowers. He also received Best Paphiopedilum in Show and Best Cypripedium in Show for his *Paph.* Lady Isabel. He also won Best Paphiopedilum Subgenus Brachypetalum in Show for *Paph. bellatulum*. Jim Marlow received Best Cymbidium in Show for *Cym. eburneum* 'Monica', and Best Pleurothallid in Show for *Masdevallia* Red Wing. He also received Best of Miscellaneous in Show, Best Specimen Plant in Show, and Best Plant in Show for his *Gongora scaphophorus*, a beautiful plant with four long, heavily flowered spikes of cream, spotted with brown, flowers.

Thank you again to all the members who contributed plants to the GROS exhibit. The plants are what make the exhibit work.

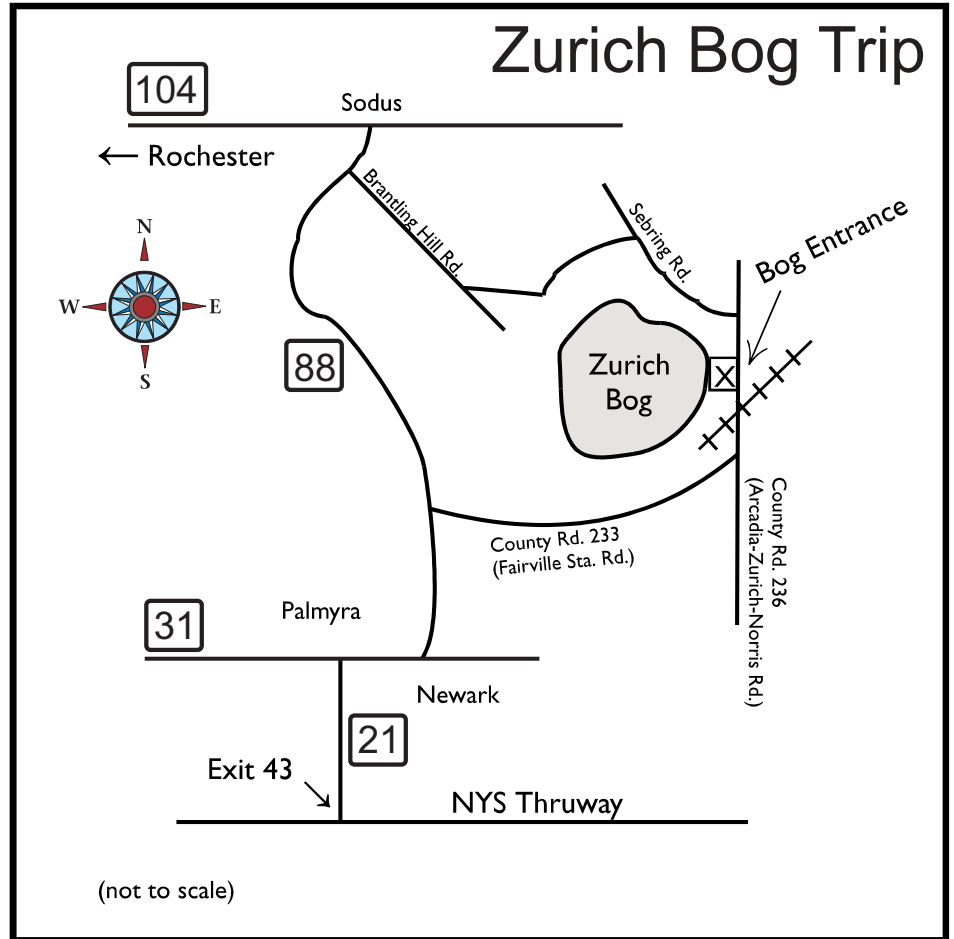

As reported earlier in this Newsletter, the GROS was very successful in our venture to exhibit at the OSNWPA show in Erie this May. More specifically, two of the three AOS awards given at the Show were won by our members. One award went to Joe Kunisch (no picture was available at press time, but his winning plant was *Catasetum complanatum*, awarded an 82 pt. AM) and one went to Sandi Uhlig for *Mill.* Princess Diana 'Sadie,' pictured above. Sandi chose the clonal name 'Sadie' in honor of the Uhlig's one-month old granddaughter.

Our show exhibit also earned a blue ribbon, with members' plants taking home many show ribbons as well as you can see in the other photo. Our thanks to the OSNWPA for the show photos and congratulations to all!



How I Grow Cymbidiums

As told to Jeanne Kaeding by Kathy Kluge, 2006 winner of the Joan Burnham Memorial Award for Best Windowsill Grown Plant at the GROS Spring Show.

I have about seven *cymbidium* plants; almost all of them are standard *cymbidiums*. This means they are largish plants, with foliage about

three feet tall. New plants can take a while to establish under my conditions, but then they tend to bloom for me every year.

I put them outside in early May. If frost is predicted I take them back inside. They sit on the north side of a picket fence. The light is like being under a lathe house. I have also grown them under a grape arbor where they got light shade. When the plants are outside, I water every other day with city tap water. The plants are generally very pot-bound so they dry out quickly. I leave the plants outside, usually until November. In the winter the plants go in an east-facing window in a room that is about 50 degrees, and there I water the *cymbidiums* only once a week. The room does not warm up much during the day in the winter as the sun is weak then.

I use a slow release rose fertilizer, Bayer Advanced Garden Rose Food 18-11-16, that I put on every three months throughout the year, winter and summer. I bought this fertilizer largely because it was cheap, and it has seemed to work well.

These are big plants with big root systems so I pot them in large pots (12 inches or so in diameter) and do not repot very often. I usually wait until they are growing out of the pot and I absolutely have to do it. I find that repotting sets them back, and sometimes they do not rebloom for a year or two after repotting. I use a mix of fir bark, perlite, and lava rock mixed together. When I put the plants outside in summer, I put an old nylon stocking over the bottom of the pot to keep slugs and snails out.

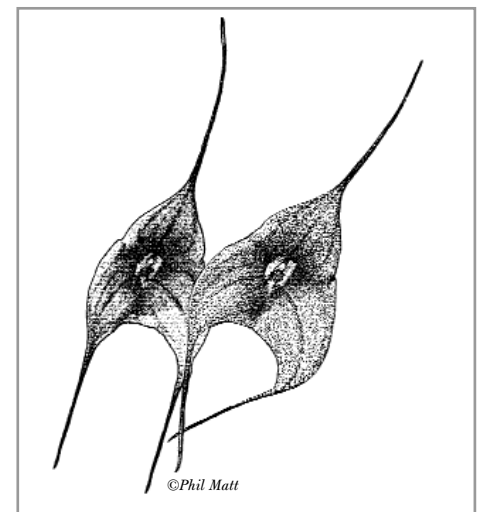
The flower spikes start to show in the fall and are starting to grow by December. I think the plants would do better if they had more light in the winter, but the east window is all I can give them and they bloom well there. I found my winning plant outside an apartment house in the snow about eight years ago where someone was throwing it out. I am delighted with the plant, even though it has no name, and am very happy to have won the award.

Ithaca's Orchid Chief Grows in Stature

Greenhouse of 10,000 blooms supplies Ithaca's Wegmans, florists

DRYDEN — The realization of Tony Liu's dream turned out much more beautifully than he ever expected.

Standing in his newly-built greenhouse on Route 366, surrounded by more than 10,000 orchids, Liu can't help but be pleased with his efforts to turn a hobby of 30 years into a viable business.

Inside the vaulted 10,000 square-foot space, there are seemingly endless expanses of vivid purple and swaths of a green-tinged white, all in exotic shapes evocative of tropical landscapes. "Because I'm getting old, I need to find something I can do the rest of my life," said Liu, 57 and a trained horticulturist.

Walking into the greenhouse off of a busy street, memories of the region's cold, cloud-covered days quickly vanish. Inside, it's warm, bright, somewhat humid and undeniably stunning. It's a work environment Liu's sister, Colleen Lee, clearly enjoys. "I take care of them just like my daughter," she said. "I sing some songs for them, too. The budding ones bow to me, and the blooming ones smile at me."

Liu and Lee primarily grow the easy-to-care-for *Phalaenopsis*, sometimes called the moth orchid. According to the American Orchid Society, it's the variety best suited to home growth because of its long-lasting blooms and its simple needs – modest light and consistent moisture.

The quality of his product and the simple care requirements have made Liu's plants a popular seller at stores around the region.

The Orchid Place, as Liu named his business, is the primary provider of phalaenopsis orchids for more than 35 Wegmans stores, including

Ithaca's, and supplies some area florists. "They're our number one plant that Wegmans sells year-round," said Katherine Shutte, manager of the Wegmans' floral department in the Ithaca store.

"For every one of those people who say they'll kill them in a second, we have people that come back and buy 10 more."

Shutte herself was a convert. Before seeing how they were cared for she was sure that her busy lifestyle would mean the death of any orchid she might buy, but she's since changed her tune. "It really is incredibly easy to care for," she said.

She attributes some of that ease to the quality of the orchids. Brought in from Liu's native Taiwan, he said he only buys the highest quality available.


In Taiwan, orchids have become big business since the island has established itself as the world's largest exporter of the blooms.

Liu is hoping to bring a little of Taiwanese culture to Ithaca with his new business. He recently opened up a retail sales division to compliment his wholesale work.

With the showroom just completed, it will serve first as a base for his orchid sales, but he sees other possibilities in the future. He would like to eventually landscape the lot with a nod to Asian gardening traditions and then even open a tea house on the property.

First, there's plenty of orders to fill and bricks and mortar to attend to. It was only last week that the business' sign was hung. These are all small steps to Liu's ultimate goal - "everywhere will be the orchids."

GROS to Lend Orchid Expertise to Butterfly Garden

Strong Museum is putting the finishing touches on a \$30,000,000 expansion that will double its size. An exciting component of the expansion is the Dancing Wings Butterfly Garden. Ralph Charlton, Ph.D., is the director of the facility. Ralph comes to the Strong Museum from Kansas State University, where he was a professor of entomology and director of the school's Butterfly Conservatory and Insect Zoo.

The Butterfly Garden is the butterfly-like structure on the side of the new addition. The "wings" are 30 feet high and 50 feet in diameter, with a membrane ceiling and an all-glass surround. Natural lighting will be supplemented by high intensity sodium and metal halide lamps. One "wing" houses the exhibit and the other encloses the support greenhouse. The garden will be a lush rain forest (about 75-85°F) with a population of approximately 750 tropical and native butterflies. Guests will walk a paved path past several "ponds" and a cascading waterfall.

Orchids and butterflies - a natural pairing - can be realized with a little help from the GROS. Let's show our support for this ambitious project by donating orchids for permanent display and by occasionally helping Ralph's staff with orchid maintenance and repotting.

To make this happen I will coordinate orchid donations and form a committee of volunteers to assist Ralph's staff. If you have warm growing orchids that are healthy and blooming-sized, please consider donating some to the Dancing Wings Butterfly Garden. For details on how to make your donation, or if you would like to be on the committee, please contact me. All donations are tax deductible.

Strong Museum will place an appropriate plaque outside the Dancing Wings Butterfly Garden to show their appreciation to the GROS for the orchid donations and support.

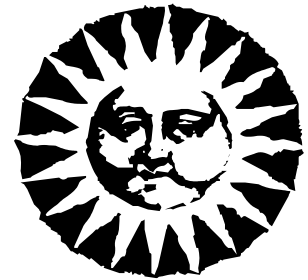
