VOLUNTEER, VOLUNTEER!

VOLUNTEER! Many hands make light work, and there is much work to be done in February and March. You all know what I mean.

Ron Uhlig, our show chairman this year, is trying to encourage first time exhibitors at the show. Particularly when you are starting out, flowering plant material can be sparse and uncertain. One solution is to band together with one or several friends and create an exhibit together. Only one orchid in bloom is needed for an exhibit.

An alternative is to enter an educational exhibit. No blooming orchids are needed for this type. We have an exhibit class for this kind of display, with first, second, and third place ribbons. There is usually not a lot of competition. An educational exhibit is judged on:

1. Educational value
2. Effectiveness of the presentation
3. Clarity of labeling explanation (how good your labels and descriptions are)
4. Appropriateness and attractiveness of staging
5. Originality.

An educational exhibit can be an easy way to start. But whatever you do, why not do it this year. Become part of the show!

The GROS January 2004 meeting was opened at 7:30 p.m. by society president **Jeanne Kaeding**. All new members were introduced and welcomed. GROS SHOW 2004 RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All plants and exhibits must be registered. They may be labeled as not for judging (NFJ.)
 2. All exhibitors entering classes A-E (displays) must register the exhibit as well as the plants.
 3. Each exhibitor agrees upon registration to abide by the rules, regulations, and judges' decisions.
 4. The judges' decisions are final.
 5. Judges will have the right to award or to withhold any scheduled prize and may substitute any class or award.
 6. All questions regarding the interpretation of the rules shall be referred to the Chairman of Judging.
 7. Only authorized persons are permitted in the show area during judging.
 8. The Genesee Region Orchid Society will take reasonable precautions for the safety of the exhibitor's property but will not be responsible for loss or damage.
 9. Orchids are to be the only flowering plants in displays other than in class #108. In class #108, orchids must be the predominant flower. No dyed flowers or dyed moss will be permitted.
 10. Tables will be furnished without cost for individual exhibits. However, display exhibitors must provide their own cloth, foliage plants, etc.
 11. Any lighting used for effect is the responsibility of and must be furnished by the exhibitor. It must be approved by the Show Chairman or Show Setup Chairman. Effect lighting may be turned off during judging.
 12. The Show Setup Chairman/Show Chairman reserve the right to limit space to any exhibitor should exhibit space become limited.
 13. The Show Committee reserves the right to judge the suitability and appropriateness of any exhibit and alter or remove the exhibit as the Show Chairman deems necessary.
 14. All plants or cut flowers entered individually will be labeled at the show in a uniform manner by the Show Setup Committee. Black labels and silver writing pens will be made available by the show committee for those wishing to use them. This year we are allowing exhibitors to pre-print the plant names onto labels. The font size should be at least 10 points and exhibitors may use either standard address labels (1" x 2 5/8") or file folder labels (2/3" x 3 7/16".) The Show Setup Chairman will provide exhibit labels based on the name provided on the exhibit entry form. If you prefer to use your own exhibit sign, please so note on the exhibit entry form. Exhibit names will not be visible until after the judging is complete.
 15. Plants eligible for the GROS Cultural Award must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least six months prior to the show.
 16. Plants eligible for the Joan Burnham Award must have been grown by the exhibitor for at least six months in the windowsill, with no artificial (except normal room lights) supplemental light.
- The plant cannot have been grown in an environment modified specifically for plants, i.e. no Wardian cases, porches converted to greenhouses with controlled humidity, etc. Areas of uncertainty can be discussed with the Judging or Registration Chairperson.
17. Cut flowers and flowering plants will be considered equally in judging.
 18. All shipments of plants, cut flowers, or exhibit material to be displayed by the Setup Committee must be received by 5:00 p.m., Thursday, March 25, 2004.
 19. In the event the exhibitor of cut flowers or plants cannot be present, the Setup Committee will display the material to the best advantage.
 20. There is no entry fee for plants or exhibits. Normal AOS fees apply to those individuals receiving AOS awards.
 21. Registration for all exhibitors will close at 9:30 p.m., Thursday, March 25, 2004. Entries for the GROS exhibit will only be accepted until 7:30 p.m., March 25, 2004. Exceptions will be considered on an individual basis—please contact the Registration Chairperson.
 22. All vendors at the show are required to enter a display in Class A or F (Educational) of at least 11 blooming plants. If the vendor will not be selling live plants at the show (sellers of jewelry, paraphernalia, etc.), contact the Show Chairman or Set-up Chairman for alternate exhibit plans. The table fee will be \$240 per eight-foot table, payable in advance to the GROS. Commercial vendors must provide one (1) orchid plant in bud or bloom per sales table, to be donated to the GROS for raffle or door prize use at the show. One or more 8-foot sales tables may be requested. The Show Setup Chairman reserves the right to limit any single vendor to a maximum of two (2) sales tables if necessary to accommodate all timely reservations.
- There are no "half table" reservations. Space will be allocated on a first come first served basis. We must receive table requests and fees by March 13, 2004. Commercial exhibits must be of sufficient artistic and flower quality as to enhance the reputation of both Vendor and the GROS show. Citation by the show committee for poor exhibit quality or the presence of insects or other pests or diseases in the exhibit may result in the Vendor not being invited to participate in future GROS shows.
23. Any plants found to contain insects or other pests will be removed from the show room and isolated.
 24. All plants and displays must be left in place until 4:00 p.m., Sunday, March 28, 2004.
 25. All plants and exhibits not claimed by 5:30 p.m., March 28, 2004 will become the property of the GROS.

30th Annual Show Taking Shape

Yesterday we saw an award certificate that had been awarded to Alan and Sue Salzman for Best of Show Orchid at the 2nd Annual GROS Show, held in 1976. The certificate was hand lettered and the name of the recipient and the president of the society had completely faded away. The technology for creating certificates has certainly changed since then (we'd probably use a PC, right?), but the interest in exhibiting prized orchids and interest in viewing them hasn't changed at all since then. You can be sure that Alan and Sue will be there this year again, hoping that one of their little babies will be this year's Best of Show.

POSTER—We had three entries for this year's poster. We have chosen to go with the entry from Tony and Denise Testa. It features pictures of two *cypripediums* grown by the Testas in their back yard along with a *paphiopedilum* and *miltoniopsis* grown by Sandi Uhlig. We thank Tony for his hard work putting the artwork together. We also thank our other two entrants: Owen Hughes (original artwork of a phalaenopsis) and Lauren Howe (photo composite emphasizing sale feature of our show). I'm still working out ideas, but I actually hope to use both of these other submissions for other purposes related to the show. PDF files for both the poster and flyer will be on the website in a few days, so check those out and print a few copies to hang at home, school, work, church and wherever else you can.

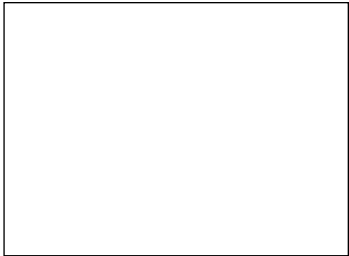
